Mahalo - means thank you!!

Mahalo Nui Loa - Thank you very much

Makai - In the direction of the ocean. Maui Sands is the Makai side of the road.

Malahini - Visitor

Ohana - Family

Ono - Delicious, also a particular fish

Paniolo - Hawaiian Cowboy

Wahine - Woman

Walking Adventures from the Condo

The street closest to the ocean that runs north and south in front of the condo and from the Times Super Market area past the Ritz Carlton Hotel is called Lower Honoapi'ilani Road. This is known by the locals as the "Lower Road".

DIRECTION

It can be a little tricky to get north/south bearings on Maui. Standing on the property, if your back is to the ocean:

NORTH is to your left. Kahana , Napili and Kapalua are north.

SOUTH is to your right. Ka'anapali , Whaler's Village and Lahaina are

WALKING SOUTH

There is a small road across the street from the Times Market parking lot, Honoapi'ilani Park Access Road will take you to the Honoapi'ilani Park and boardwalk. Walk to the shoreline anywhere in this area, and you will find a long, sandy beach. One of the prettiest beaches on Maui! You can also walk on the boardwalk, running the length of the 3 mile beach south. If you are in the mood for a longer walk, Black Rock is at the end of the boardwalk, above the Sheraton Hotel in Ka'anapali . Go left and walk around the Rock, then back to the beach and continue to Whalers Village Shopping Center, which is about a quarter of a mile. This is a good place to relax and wander through the shops or enjoy some refreshments. There are restaurants and a small food court offering everything from vegan raw food to pizza.



WALKING NORTH

You can opt to walk for exercise or for relaxation. If you choose to exercise, head to Akahele Street and turn right. Go across the Honoapi'ilani Highway at the crosswalk and up the hill to the Kapalua Airport. The views are great and you'll get quite a workout. If you prefer a more leisurely walk, follow the Lower Road. Stops along the way are the Kahana Gateway Shopping Center (check out Dollies for food and drink. A local pub. Also Miso Phat for sushi!), Napili Plaza and the Ritz Carlton, which is 5 miles north. Be aware that on the Lower Road you will be walking with no sidewalk on a narrow shoulder in some areas. Always walk on the left facing the oncoming traffic.

Endangered Species

HONU HAWAIIAN SEA TURTLE

Honu can be found munching on the seaweed along the volcanic reef fronting the shoreline any time of day.

PLEASE BE AWARE

Honu are a protected species and are susceptible to human diseases. Fines can be assessed for touching a sea turtle.

When coming into contact with honu , whether on the sand or in the ocean, please keep a safe distance of 15 20 feet.

Honu are very photogenic, so feel free to record your encounter by taking as many pictures as you like as long as you refrain from using flash photography!

HAWAIIAN MONK SEAL

The ancient Hawaiian name was “Ilio holo i ka uaua” meaning “dog that runs in rough water.” The Hawaiian monk seal is one of the most endangered marine mammals in the world, and the rarest seal or sea lion in US waters.

At Maui Sands Seaside we are fortunate enough to have a female that likes to visit our shoreline and reef a few times a year. Keep Your Distance! Fines are assessed for touching and seals bite!



Beaches Near the Condo

Please note that the snorkeling off the shore at Maui Sands Seaside is excellent. There are usually turtles in the water outside either the second or 3rd reef. Look for low to mid tide for the best experience. You can go to <http://www.hawaiitides.com> for a current tide table for the day.

Another Note about Maui Beaches - you will find that most beaches have easy access and well marked paths to the beach. Maui does not have private beaches and access to the beach is allowed for everyone.

Snorkel Gear can be rented at one of several vendors within a 3 5 min. walking distance of the condo:

- Snorkel Bob's is in the Times shopping Center south
- All About Fish is just north and across the street (best place to rent fishing gear as well!)
- Boss Frogs is also just north and has a great selection of beach gear!

S - TURNS PARK

A well known surfing spot, 1.2 miles north of the condo and is at the beginning of the Kahana Beach area. This is a good swimming and sunbathing area with a short walking beach, as well as picnic tables and charcoal BBQ grills. The spot is not known for snorkeling, but locals surf here.

KA'ANAPALI BEACH

This is a beach area that is south of the condo and continues for 5 miles. It runs from the Sheraton Hotel on Ka'anapali Parkway, to Lahaina. There are many entrance points to the beach in this area.

KAHEKILI BEACH PARK

This area is known as 'Airport Beach'. Take the Lower Road south to Honoapi'ilani Highway and turn right. At Kai Alai Drive, which is at the second light, turn right and continue right on the winding road until you reach the park and beach area. This is an excellent spot for picnics and barbecues, snorkeling and long beach walks. Parking and public restrooms are available. Great place to watch the sunset.

BLACK ROCK

Located south on Ka'anapali Beach next to the Sheraton Hotel and is ranked in the top ten of off shore diving spots. Be Aware that parking in the Whalers Village parking lot is expensive. There is designated beach parking if you go south past the entrance to the Whalers Village parking area and take the next right. These spaces are usually taken, so you may want to opt to take The Maui Bus. From the ABC store just south of Maui Sands Seaside. Bus schedules are available on line. Once at the beach, turn right and walk to the black rock jutting into the ocean. Be aware that waves break close to the shore so entering the ocean can be difficult. Once in the ocean, explore both sides of the rock. It is safe to swim in this area, but you will most likely be sharing the ocean with Manta Rays and Sea Turtles, which can reach up to 400 pounds!

NAPILI BAY

Located about 4 miles north of the condo and is well marked and easy to find. Park near any of the beach access signs and walk to the beach. This is a well protected bay with a long sandy beach; excellent for snorkeling.

KAPALUA BAY

Located a bit north of the road from Napili Bay and has a well marked parking lot. Shade trees are part of the beach ambience.

IRONWOOD

Located just north Kapalua Bay at the Ironwood subdivision, which is a gated area. Park to the left of the guard house and walk toward the ocean; you will find a paved path that leads down a hill to the ocean to a beautiful sandy bay. The area is known for surfing and has a lovely beach to enjoy for the day. Usually this is overlooked because it looks like a private area.

FLEMING BEACH

Located north just past the Ritz Carlton off Honoapi'ilani Highway and is an excellent beach in a park like setting. Look for Office Road going north on Honoapi'ilani Hwy, and turn left onto Office Rd. This is also the end of Lwr . Honoapi'ilani Rd. If you want a leisurely drive just take a left from the parking lot at Maui Sands seaside and go to the end of the road. This beach is great for snorkeling, body surfing, boogie boarding or surfing. Tip for after beach snacks or lunch go back up Office Rd toward the hwy. about 1/4 mile up on your left is the Honolua General store. Great sandwiches and local favorites, with picnic table outside to enjoy your meal.

SLAUGHTERHOUSE BEACH

One of the most popular surfing spots on the island. Look for a chain link fence at the top of the beach. There is a steep walk down to the beach area.

HONOLUA BAY

Located off Honoapi'ilani Hwy north of The Office Rd turn off. 5.8 miles north of Maui Sands Seaside on the Honoapi'ilani Hwy. This is a Marine Reserve area and is known for excellent snorkeling on the left side of the bay. This area is very popular, so an early start to the day here is advised.

Baby Beaches

Baby Beaches are located in areas that are calmer and safer for keiki (children, pronounced kay kee). There is typically a protective reef close to the shore. The shoreline in front of the Maui Sands Seaside is perfect for keiki of all ages to play in the water at low to mid tide. There are volcanic reefs that run parallel to the shore creating an area protected from ocean surge and waves.

PLEASE NOTE - One of the first things we teach keiki is to never turn your back on the ocean.

HONOKOWAI BEACH PARK

Located north of Maui Sands Seaside across from the Farmer's Market on Lower Honoapi'ilani Road. There are picnic benches, a restroom and a playground.

LAHAINA BABY BEACH

One of the most popular beaches for small children because it is located on a sandy beach and has a rocky breakwater line offshore, which blocks the largest waves. The water is usually very calm near the shore. I recommend going at low to mid tide. It is located in Lahaina. From the Lower Honoapi'ilani Rd, turn right on Honoapi'ilani Highway and go to Kai Pali, about 4 miles south. Turn right; go past the 'Jesus is Coming' sign near the Mala Ramp. Park anywhere on the side street and follow the beach access signs. I recommend an umbrella and beach chairs, there are no shade trees at this beach.



Other Maui Beaches

I've covered most of the beaches north of Maui Sands Seaside. These are beaches south and in other area of the island. They are in geographic order from northern most to southernmost.

MILE MARKER 14

Look for the mile marker south along the Honoapi'ilani Hwy. This is a very popular area that is an excellent spot for snorkeling. The coral formations in this area create a series of narrow canyon walls that are enjoyable to glide through, but be very careful or you can come out of the water with lots of scrapes!

MA'ALAEA

This is the area at the boat harbor where the Maui Ocean Center is located. The longest beach walk in the state of Hawaii can be enjoyed here. Turn next to the Maui Ocean Center on Hau'oli Road and follow it all the way to the end. Leave your car and walk to the edge of the water, and head south. This stretch of beach has hatching areas for sea turtles and a bird and wildlife sanctuary. There is a great boardwalk over a portion of the wildlife sanctuary if you drive further south and turn right onto North Kihei Rd. Further on the drive south, along North Kihei Rd, you will find the Sugar Beach Resort area and a local favorite bar and restaurant, Dena's Sandwitch .

KAMAOLE BEACHES I, II, III AND THE COVE

These are all beaches lining the 8 miles stretch along the coast of Kihei. Locals refer to these as Kam one, two etc. The Cove is a little spot between Kam I and II where the locals love to boogie board and surf. All these beaches are lovely sugar sand beaches with restroom, picnic tables and charcoal BBQ grills. These beaches get very busy, especially on weekends as they are spots where the locals love to hang. Fave eateries in Kihei include Café O'Lei (best sushi and fish specials!), Roasted Chiles and for local cuisine Nalu's (locally sourced healthy food and a great bar with local music in the evenings). There is a skate park, basketball courts and a roller hockey rink at Kam I.

ULUA BEACH

Located off Wailea on Wailea Alanui Rd, which is further south of Kihei. This is a sandy beach which is great for swimming and snorkeling, especially in the mornings; it can get windy in the afternoon, making the ocean choppy. Body boarders enjoy this area when the surf is up. There is a park nearby, a small parking lot and public restrooms.

MAKENA BEACH

Also known as Big Beach. This beach is located at the south end of Wailea, on Makena Alanui Rd, off Wailea Alanui Rd. This is a great beach for experienced boogie boarders and body surfers. It is known for having a great beach, but heavy surf, so this is not a beach for amateur swimmers. It is typically sunny when it is raining on other parts of the island. Porta potties only.

LITTLE BEACH

Located on the north side of Makena Beach. There is a very short hike from the north end of Makena Beach and over the hill. Please note Little Beach is traditionally 'clothing optional', even though nudity on any public beach in the state of Hawaii is not legal.

LAPEROUSE BAY OR KOENE'O'IO

Located 3 miles south of Makena, at the end of Wailea Alanui Rd. This area is a rocky beach but is a great place to snorkel. You will typically encounter sea turtles, dolphins and colorful fish. If you are a hiker, this is also the start of the King's Highway, referring to King Kamehameha 1st, that at one time circled the island. It was later named for the French explorer Captain Jean François de Galaup , comte de La Pérouse

KANAHA PARK

Located near the airport in Kahului. There is a long walking beach with a well shaded park which is a favorite spot of wind surfers. There are restrooms and picnic tables. There is not much sandy beach, but we mention it here because it is a fave of wind surfers.

BALDWIN PARK

Located just before Pai'a , on the Hana Hwy, west of the Kahului Airport. There is a long sandy beach with an outdoor pavilion, and a really nice skate park. Good for swimming and boogie boarding. It can be windy in the afternoon.

HO'OKIPA

located a couple of miles past Pai'a off the Hana Hwy. Great surfing beach! World wind surfing championships are held here and are for experts only! Tip This is on the way to Mama's Fish House and a great stop just to watch the surfers. Mamas is very authentic Pacific Cuisine with FRESH local fish. Rated one of the best restaurants in the US by TripAdvisor, Zagat and Conde Nast.

Driving Trip Around the North Head

This is not an adventure to experience on the same day you do the Road to Hana trip. From the time you leave the condo and make the loop it will take at least two and a half hours. Always do this trip from the condo going north; never go the opposite direction. Be prepared for one lane mountain roads. Go slow and if you're on a one lane road and can't see around the corner, stop and blow your horn!

From the condo, go north toward Kapalua. About 10 minutes past the Ritz Carlton turnoff, start watching for areas where local cars have pulled off and follow the rails. If you follow the trails, most of them will lead to excellent snorkeling or surfing spots. You can make this a driving trip only if you choose.

NAKALELE BLOW HOLE

Watch for the lighthouse, then pull off to the left where it is marked by large stones that are about 3 feet tall. Park and follow the trail toward the ocean. If you end up on the wrong side of a steep valley running out to the ocean, you will still see the Blow Hole spouting in the distance. Just cross the valley and you can get as close as you dare. It is obviously recommended that you do not stand directly over the Blow Hole!

Several locals have set up roadside businesses including art, homemade cookies and bread, shaved ice, local fruit and BBQ fish. Stop and enjoy their wares and their friendly chatter.

Once in Wailuku, you have several choices. You can experience a great lunch on Main Street at the highly recommended Wailuku Coffee Company, the Farmacy or at Café 808 Main Street. You may also enjoy a walk through the pawn and antique shops on Market Street. Down the hill you will find the island's largest shopping center, Queen Ka'ahumanu Shopping Center in Kahului.



Up-Country Drive

You may want to devote a day to exploring the Up-Country towns of Paia, Makawao and Kula. Go to the corner of Hwy 36 and Dairy Road; turn right towards Hana Hwy 36 and drive until you reach Paia town to begin your adventure.

PAIA

(paw-ee-ah) is a unique little town full of local color and creativity. Park your car and wander around the shops. If you would like upscale dining there is Mama's Fish House, which has excellent food! Look for the white boat out front. If you prefer something more relaxed, head to the Pai'a Fish Market, located at the stop light at the center of town. They serve good, fresh fish! Sit at a picnic table inside. Charlies is a local favorite for food and entertainment as well!

HO'OKIPA

(ho-o-kee-pa) is just east of Paia and is known as the wind surfing capitol of the world. If you get to the area early in the day, you can enjoy the beach first then go back to Paia for lunch.

MAKAWAO

(maw-ka-wa-o) is the next stop. Head up Baldwin Avenue, and park in the first available spot. As you enter town, one of the first points of interest is an art gallery, with a small outdoor mall located behind; this

houses a deli, a boutique shop and a glass blower. Makawao is known as 'Cowboy Town' and it is not unusual to find cowboys riding their horses on the streets. These paniolo (cowboys) have a history pre dating horses on the mainland! Enjoy great local eateries including the favorite Polli's Mexican Cantina, just north of town on Makawao Avenue. If you are on Maui for Independence day, you may want to consider a trip to Makawao for the morning parade and the afternoon rodeo!

KULA LODGE

Leave Makawao by continuing up the hill on Baldwin Avenue. Turn right on Hanamu Road by the rodeo grounds, take it to the Haleakala Hwy and turn left onto Hwy 377. Along the road you will see Jacaranda trees with their purple flowers and roadside trees that bear yellow fruit, called loquat. You will also find cement bunkers built in preparation for an attack on Maui during WWII that never happened. The Lodge will be on the right. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served, and the views are great. Next door is a small gift shop with books about local birds, plants and points of interest. On the lower level there is a general store that has an excellent selection of wine, cheese, gifts and snacks and local art. Just past the lodge is the turn off for Haleakala; this is a great place to have breakfast after you have watched the sunrise from the top of the mountain.

TEDESCHI VINEYARDS

This is a great drive with amazing views and unique stops along the way, which includes flower farms and fruit stands. Try the Kula strawberries and sweet corn. A favorite stop is Grandma's Restaurant; don't miss the Pineapple Macadamia nut muffins! The Vineyard offers tours of the grounds and hourly wine tastings.

Sunrise on Haleakalā Volcano

RESERVATIONS REQUIRED

Visitors wishing to view sunrise at Haleakalā National Park will need to make reservations ahead of time at recreation.gov

You will want to make your reservations as soon as possible, they fill up fast.

- Reservations are now available, online only, up to 60 days in advance of your sunrise visit.
- You can call the reservation line at 1-877-444-6777 to make a reservation over the phone.
- A small number of last minute tickets are released online two days beforehand at 4:00 PM HST. The website will show tickets as sold out until 4:00 PM.
- Please note that calling the park directly, or visiting in person, will not result in a reservation since staff at Haleakala National Park are unable to make reservations for you.
- Reservations are required for each vehicle entering the park during sunrise hours from 3:00 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. and are available year round for a \$1.50 fee per vehicle.
- Visitors without a reservation may only enter the park after 7:00 a.m.
- Identification (photo id) must match the name on the reservation confirmation. Reservations do not ensure a parking space.
- The park entrance fee is separate and payable via credit card on the day of your visit. Paying the entrance fee with a credit card will reduce wait times at the entrance station.
- Be prepared for all kinds of weather. Temperatures at the Summit are at least 20 degrees colder than at sea level and often drop below freezing. Dress warmly or in layers. After sunrise, visit the Kula Lodge for a delicious breakfast and get warm at their beautiful fireplace.

Tip - When you pay your entry fee, it is good for all national parks in Hawaii, including the 'Ohe'o Pools west of Hana.

Ways to Explore Haleakalā

HIKING HALEAKALA

Haleakala offers an enjoyable hiking experience for a couple of hours or several days.

BIKING FROM THE TOP

Take an adventurous ride from the top of the crater at Haleakala. For safety, be sure to use an appropriate bike with mountain brakes rather than a street bike. There are bicycle groups you can book with, or you can rent a bicycle to take the trip down the volcano at your own pace. We like Maui Sunriders for a self guided trip <https://mauisunriders.com/>

SUNSET AND METEOR SHOWERS

Reservations are not necessary for viewing the sunset. This is a wonderful way to watch a sunset on Maui! If you are on the island during mid August, consider visiting Haleakala for sunset and the Perseiads meteor shower. This is the period of time when you can expect to see spectacular meteor showers!

Road to Hana

It has been said that the road to Hana is like life...it's not just getting there, it's the journey!

Be prepared for 56 one lane bridges and 617 curves.

- You might consider riding in the front seat if you are susceptible to motion sickness or offer to do the driving yourself.
- If you wish, you can download a current guide to help you decide where to stop and what you want to see.
- There are a few choices for food along the way, but it's always fun to have a picnic! We like to stop at the Maui Garden of Eden to the right at mile marker 10.5. Spectacular views! There is a cooler for picnicking, and blue ice in the freezer.
- I advise leaving anything of value at home that is not easy to carry on your person. Car break ins happen on this road.
- ALWAYS pay attention to "Private Property" signs. Even though a guide book says it's great, if it sits on private land you will be trespassing if you ignore those signs.

This is an all day adventure to be enjoyed in the Rainforest of Maui. In order to truly appreciate the experience, it's best to leave early in the morning for your 13 hour day, or if you have time and can find accommodation, you may want to make this an overnight adventure. Accommodations in Hana are very limited though, so try to plan ahead.

It is possible to make the entire loop around the south side of Maui, but be aware that most rental car companies do not allow you to take a rented vehicle on the entire loop. Once you have reached the 'Seven Sacred Pools', you are at the halfway point. The roads are not as comfortable and there are frequent wash outs, so be prepared to need to turn around, and because you will be traveling on some unpaved portions, it is a good idea to not make the trip around the southern end if it is raining.

Please note that there are tour companies offering Road to Hana trips. You can simply sit back and ride in their vehicle and enjoy the view! Usually, lunch and snacks are provided on these tours, but there is no time for long stops.

TWIN FALLS FRUIT STAND AND HIKE

this hike is on the road to Hana, and takes about an hour to or all day if you want to stop and swim in the pools. There are multiple waterfalls scattered along the trail. To get to the Falls, go to the city of Pai'a and follow Hana Hwy (Hwy 36) through Pai'a toward Hana. Go about 2 miles past the Hwy 365 junction to the Holloway Bridge and park. There is a fruit stand set up. Entrance to the trail is at a well worn crossing in the fence. Watch for 'Keep Out' signs and be very careful not to trespass on private property. Stay on the trail. There are several good swimming spots on the trail. We strongly advise to forgo diving or jumping into the pools. Medical care is a bit distant.

Food Along the Road to Hana

Before you reach Hana you will see food, flower and fruit stands along the way. The hours and days open vary greatly, so we are not making recommends here. Most are wonderful friendly and have good food. A small café is located on the right just as you enter Hana. They serve delicious smoked fish and you must try it coconut candy.

FOOD IN HANA

HANA HOTEL

Good food but on the higher end price wise. There is an excellent art gallery located inside the hotel. They do offer a lovely Sunday Brunch.

ICE CREAM AND SNACK SHOP

Turn left toward Hana Bay; located at the Bay. There are many picnic tables located near the edge of the water. If you are spending the night, this is a great place to get breakfast!

TIP

Take some cash with you. Many of the flower and fruit stands are un-manned and use the honor system. A cash box is located on the stand for payment.



Favorite Stops Along the Road to Hana

I could easily give you a list of 10 or 20 great stops, but these are the ones we **ALWAYS** stop at:

GARDEN OF EDEN MILE MARKER 10.5

There is a small fee to enter, and it is worth the price. They specialize in native plants though you will see quite a few non native tropical species as well. Some of the specimens are rare even for Hawaii. You will receive a map of their extensive trails through the garden, and there is a wonderful lookout point to view a waterfall on the road below. There is no rubbish pickup in Hana and residents have to drive their rubbish to the dump, so be prepared to pack out what you take in. There is a sweet little café, and a wonderful gift shop with locally and skillfully made items. We like to bring a picnic with us. There are some wonderful views from the garden.

KEANAE PENINSULA MILE MARKER 16

Go left on the next road after you leave the Arboretum. This short ride dead ends at the ocean. You will see some traditional taro fields that have been kept by farmers in this area for centuries. This is a wonderful little community. This is another favorite stop if you brought a picnic lunch. Be very careful of the shoreline here.

WAI'ANAPANAPA STATE PARK

watch for the sign just before reaching Hana which points toward the park, turn left and follow the road leading into the park. Leave your car and walk towards the ocean and the caves. Wai'anapanapa means "glistening water" and offers a little something for everyone, including a picture perfect black sand beach, sea arches, a blowhole, freshwater caves, hiking and walking trails, lava tubes, cliff jumping, and stunning panoramic views of the rugged East Maui coastline.

HANA BAY

Follow the signs until you reach Hana Bay; this is the location of the Snack Shop and picnic tables.

KOKI BEACH PARK, RED SAND BEACH

Continue up the hill from Hana Bay and turn left at Haneoo Road.



Favorite Stops Past Hana

HAMOA BEACH

The next stop after Koki Beach Park. You will need to park above the beach and take a walk down the trail to the beach. This is a favorite local surfing site with beautiful emerald green waters and an exquisite beach. If Tony's Place food stand at the end of Haneoo Rd, before you get back on the Hana Hwy, is open the food is wonderful!

THE POOLS OF OHE'O AKA SEVEN SACRED POOLS

The most popular destination in east Maui. Since 'Ohe'o is Part of the Haleakala National Park, the fee you pay here will also get you in to the Haleakala Summit (and vice versa so save your receipt!) Admission to the entire park is \$15 for a three day pass or \$25 bucks gets you an annual pass to Haleakala, Volcanoes (Big Island) and Pu'uhonua O Honaunau (Big Island) National Parks. The Kīpahulu District of

Haleakalā National Park, where 'Ohe'o is located, can be accessed by driving 12 miles past the town of Hāna. This area of the coast has been inhabited by Hawaiians for hundreds of years and remains an integral part of the thriving culture. Visitors to the Kīpahulu District are treated to views of waterfalls, sweeping ocean vistas, and Hawaiian cultural experiences. If you plan to hike up to the pools, you WILL need sturdy shoes and you should take water. It is not recommended that you jump into the pools. People have been killed jumping and it is now kapu. Do visit the visitors center. There is always someone super knowledgeable on duty, and they carry a wonderful selection of books about Maui and Hawaii

Tip - Call 808.572.4400 Option 2 on the day of your trip to find out if the pools are open.

CHARLES LINDBURGH GRAVE AT PALAPALA HO'OMAU CHURCH

Continue on the road after leaving the pools, drive one mile and turn left at a paved driveway. Notice the sign for the Palapala Ho'omau Congregational Church. Continue on the drive until it seems to end and turn left; park in the church parking lot. The graves of Charles Lindbergh and his good friend, Charlie Pryor are located here. There are small graves in between their burial sites where Charlie's beloved chimpanzee's are buried. Please treat this site with reverence and respect.

BEWARE that you will be on a bumpy road for about seven miles until you reach the church and grave site; part of it will be gravel. Watch out for cows and horses that sometimes wander onto the road.



Day Hiking on Maui

We try to make sure there is a copy of "Hiking Maui" by Robert Smith in the condo. Please make sure you return it to the condo if you remove it. If you are considering a hike in the mountain areas, know that afternoon showers are common, so morning hikes are best.

The best hiking attire would include sturdy hiking shoes. Pack drinking water and a poncho to be prepared for showers. Shorts conducive for swimming work well. For safety, we do not recommend hiking in rain anywhere in Hawaii. Red mud gets very slippery and volcanic rock can be sharp.

Always take a charged cell phone and a flashlight.

These are some of our faves:

KAPALUA HIKING TRAILS

Go north on the Honoapi'ilani Rd. (left from the condo property) and to the very end of the rd. Straight ahead is Fleming Beach Park. The head of the trail though is right onto Office Rd, past The Ritz Carlton and to the parking lot for the Village Café and the golf pro shop. Park here. To your left is a paved trail leading through the golf greens, going under the highway and ending up at a sign pointing to several trails that go along the old golf course. Some trails are easier than others, and most loop. You can take a wonderful hour long hike, or spend the day exploring.

I'AO STREAM

This hike takes one to two hours. Find Iao Needle on your map, which is just west of Wailuku. There is a paved parking lot. Follow the stream up the mountain. For the first ten minutes, it is an easy hike with lots of others on the trail.

KEPANIWAI PARK OR HERITAGE PARK

This is a small, beautiful park located just outside the entrance to Iao. The park is dedicated to the huge diversity of Maui and the contributions immigrants have made to the culture and community. There are several trails through the park and although is in the process of being restored, it is a local favorite for family get togethers and picnics. The tap water here is from a fresh spring, and delicious. We always take an extra jug with us to fill up before we go.



Activities

BIKE TRIPS

There are bike rental companies available if you want to ride around the island on your own on a bicycle. There are several companies that rent bikes for general purposes or for more adventurous rides down from the heights of Haleakala. Just be sure that you don't rent a street bike to take to the top of the crater, because most street bikes are not equipped with mountain brakes. You can choose to ride alone or glide down the crater with a group of other adventurers.

This list is ordered by closest to furthest from the property:

THE FARMERS MARKET

The Farmers Market is just a 3 minute walk north (left) from the property entrance, and across the street. This is one of our favorite spots for buying locally grown fruits ad veg. They have a great little vegan deli with sandwiches, soups, acai bowls and you can also purchase locally made guacamole, salsa and hummus.

TIMES MARKET

Times Market is a short walk south and across the street. This is a large supermarket chain with a deli, and pharmacy.

LONGS DRUGS & WALGREENS

Longs Drugs & Walgreens are across the street from each other about 4 miles south off Honoapi'ilani Hwy. They both carry a small selection of locally grown produce, eggs and beef.

FOODLAND FARMS

Foodland Farms is across from Walgreens and in the Lahaina Gateway Shopping Center. This grocery store has a wonderful deli, butcher and produce selection. Foodland and Foodland Farms are known for having some of the BEST poke (Hawaiian fresh marinated fish, the Hawaiian version of sashimi).

SAFEWAY

Safeway is on your right in Lahaina Cannery Mall, with Longs Drugs on the other end of the mall. This is a BIG Safeway store, and you can find most items here. They also carry a selection of organic and local produce.

MAUI PRIME FOODS

Maui Prime Foods is located at 142 Kupuohi St F-7, up the hill and the next right turn from Foodland Farms. If you want prime meat for the grill, or a special charcuterie selection, or a great wine to go with dinner. This is the spot!

LAHAINA GROCERY DEPOT

Lahaina Grocery Depot is one of my all time favorite grocery stores. They are located on the right as you drive up towards Maui Prime at 58 Kupuohi St. Great selection of local meats and produce! Very clean store!

A note about water

Our water is very clean and drinkable, but if you do not like the taste, we ask that you forgo the use of plastic bottles and use the water pitcher in the fridge. We change the filter every 3 months without fail!

Laundry

Maui Sands Seaside does not have a laundry room. Currently we do not offer personal laundry service, although we require a linen change for every 2 weeks of your stay, and we can schedule a linen change at your request. The fee is \$50.00.

We use 24 Hour Coin Op in Lahaina for doing laundry. They are located at 1036 Limahana Pl, Lahaina. It is well kept and clean. There is a money changing machine as well as soap vending machines.
